Survivor Clinic

Survivors of childhood cancer can develop health problems after finishing cancer treatment. These health problems are called **late effects**. Survivors are at risk for certain late effects based on the type of treatment they received. You can find out about late effects you might be at risk for by **visiting a cancer survivor clinic**. All childhood cancer survivors should visit a survivor clinic. During a survivor clinic visit you will:

- Learn about possible late effects of your cancer treatment
- Have tests done to screen for those late effects
- Get a Survivor Healthcare Plan document

Survivor Healthcare Plan

A Survivor Healthcare Plan (SHP) is a document with information about your:

- Cancer diagnosis and treatment
- Late effects that can occur after your treatment
- Tests to screen for these late effects

The SHP is helpful for you to know what health problems could occur after your cancer treatment. It will also tell you the tests you will need to screen for these problems and how often you will need to have certain tests. It is also helpful for all of your doctors (pediatrician, family practice, cardiologist etc) to have this information. Your doctors and nurses can use the SHP to learn about your cancer, cancer treatment, and late effects you are at risk for.

Finding a Survivor Clinic

If you have never been to a survivor clinic you should call the cancer center where you were treated. They will tell you where should go to for a survivor clinic visit. Listed below is contact information for the 5 cancer centers for children in Georgia.
